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Executive Summary

1 - Executive Summary

Introduction

As a society, we are increasingly aware of the psychological and physical benefits provided by open space and recreation. It is Vevay Township's primary goal to actively promote these benefits for the public's well-being in the form of providing and developing recreational areas and activities. Doing this helps to increase Vevay Township's livability. However, there are many issues to consider when planning for these recreational areas and opportunities. This plan intends to be the guiding document for the promotion of these recreational opportunities in Vevay Township.

As ongoing health studies show, our society is becoming more conscious of healthy living and the opportunities that recreation provides to further healthy lifestyles and improve our quality of life. Health studies also reflect the alarming need for increased physical activity for people of all ages in order to achieve these healthier lifestyles. Finally, improvement to a community's quality of life through recreation also has the potential to better the local economy by drawing new business opportunities to the area. Studies have shown that businesses are drawn to communities that provide quality lifestyles for prospective employees.

Therefore, it is important to project the future parks and recreation needs of Vevay Township to ensure the availability of open space and recreational opportunities. To address these issues and opportunities, it is important for the Township to produce a plan to guide the decision-making process. When implemented, this plan will provide quality parks and recreation programs and facilities throughout the community.

Purpose

The Michigan Department of Natural Resources (MDNR) requires that community recreation plans be updated every five years as part of the criteria to receive funding from the State in the form of grants for park and open space acquisition, park development, and improvements to existing park facilities. The purpose of this procedure is to provide an opportunity to include changing needs and assets for the community. This Recreation Plan was developed by analyzing an inventory of issues and physical features for the area and tailoring development of recreation programs and facilities in a systematic manner, or plan, through the next five years; meeting the requirement (guidelines) of the MDNR.

Scope

Vevay Township currently has one developed township-owned park, three cemeteries and one other non-developed park property. The Community Parks and Recreation Plan inventories these sites as well as existing recreation facilities and programs in the area. With this information, the needs for parks, supporting facilities, trailway/greenway systems, and recreation programs are analyzed for the next five years. The recommendations in this plan are provided through analysis of demographic projections, land-use trends, natural features inventory, citizen input, past and future recreational trends, state and federal grant funding requirements and potential land acquisition opportunities.

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Community Description

2 - Community Description

Plan Jurisdiction

The 2022-2026 Vevay Township Community Parks & Recreation Plan has been developed to serve as a guide and decision making document for future recreation facilities and programs within Vevay Township. This plan focuses on parks, trails and natural areas. The plan includes an assessment of current facilities and programs, as well as the acquisition and development of new facilities and programs based on the current and future anticipated demands. It also considers linkages throughout the township to other communities.

Vevay Township is located in Ingham County, approximately 4.5 miles southeast of the City of Lansing. Vevay Township is approximately 31.64 square miles in area. The Township has easy accessibility to US-127, and M-36.




Figure 2.1: Township Location Map



Social Characteristics

City Population

According to the 2020 U.S. Decennial Census, the population of Vevay Township is 3,606, which represents a 1.9 percent increase in the number of people living in the Township since 2010. Vevay township has a population density of 114 people/ square mile.

Age Structure

Age characteristics are a useful demographic indicator for recreation planning purposes as a community's age composition helps determine the appropriate mix of needed recreation services and facilities. The types and location of recreation facilities and programs will depend, in part, upon the age structure of the population. The following table breaks down the various age groups using data from the American Community Survey (ACS) 2018 estimate.

The largest age category, representing over 33 percent of the population in the Township, contains those between the ages of 40-64. The senior citizen population represents 19.7 percent.

The age structure of Vevay Township indicates that there is need for recreation facilities that serve a wide range of ages from young children to senior citizens. Young children need diverse programming offering a wide range of activities and events. Children learn the fundamentals of sports through organized baseball, softball, basketball and soccer leagues. Day camps bring children together to create arts and crafts, go swimming or learn about nature. The 20-to-49 year old age group needs family-related programming that targets people their age. Organized softball leagues are popular in many communities. This group may also desire access to other forms of recreation like golf, hockey and basketball. In the future, demand for recreation facilities for senior citizens may increase due to the retirement of the "baby boom" generation, and translate into a need for more passive park areas. Bicycle and walking paths provide an excellent opportunity for an entire family to participate in a recreational activity. Providing greater accessibility to park facilities

for senior citizens may include providing parking or drop off areas closer to fields, large lettering on signage, and more seating and shaded areas.




Figure 3.1: Parks and Recreation Organizational Chart

Funding Sources (Current)

General Fund

The General Fund is the basic operating fund for Vevay Township. General Fund revenues are derived from property taxes, state-shared revenues, federal grants, license and permit fees, charges for services, interest on investments, and court fines or forfeitures. Recreation program user fees are usually channeled through the General Fund.

Funding Sources (Potential)

User Fees

The community can charge fees to the users of specific recreation facilities, or for enrollment in recreation programs. User fees can provide substantial support for park facilities. Other communities throughout Michigan have established user fees for swimming pools, tennis courts, the use of lighted athletic fields, and the use of indoor facilities. User fees are a promising source of funding in a municipality if used selectively for specific facilities and services.

Ingham County Trails and Park Millage Grant Program

In March 2020, Ingham County voters approved renewing the millage to support the development of a county-wide regional trails and parks system. The .5 mill levy will raise an estimated \$4 million per year over the next six years. All government entities within ingham County are eligible to apply for grant funding. The application must demonstrate a direct benefit to Ingham County residents and applications are accepted for the following categories:

- Trail
- Blueway
- Boardwalk
- Bridge
- Planning & engineering
- Small community grants up to \$300,000.00 for municipalities contributing less than 5% of total county millage revenue collected to date.
- The Park Commission and Board of Commissioners will consider any application even if it does not specifically fit the above categories.

Michigan Department of Natural Resources Grants

The following is a summary of the three viable recreation grant programs now available through the Michigan Department of Natural Resources (MDNR):

Recreation Passport Grants: PA 32 of 2010 created the Local Public Recreation Facilities Fund to be used for the development of public recreation facilities for local units of government. Money for this fund is derived from the sale of the Recreation Passport which replaced the resident Motor Vehicle Permit (MVP) — or window sticker — for state park entrance. Development grants of \$7,500 to \$150,000 are available to local governments with a focus on renovating and improving existing parks, although new parks are also eligible. The grantee must provide at least a

25% match. Projects are evaluated based on project need, site quality, project quality, applicant history, and, if two projects receive the same evaluation score, a criterion based on the project cost per capita.

Land and Water Conservation Fund (LWCF): Eligible projects include community recreation and trailway improvements. These are grants of \$30,000 to \$500,000 to local governments for development of facilities such as athletic fields, tennis courts, playgrounds, trails and picnic areas, including support facilities, and the renovation and retro-fitting of existing facilities to make them accessible to persons with disabilities. Funds are provided through federal appropriations from the National Park Service. The grant match basis is fifty percent (50%) MDNR grant and fifty percent (50%) local match. Projects are evaluated based on project need, applicant history, site and project quality, and a fourth criterion based on the type of proposed project.

Michigan Natural Resources Trust Fund (MNRTF). Communities must have an approved recreation plan to apply for this grant. Eligible projects include acquisition of land or rights in land for recreational uses or for protection of the land because of its environmental importance or scenic beauty, including additions to existing parks, forest lands or wildlife areas. Development of public outdoor recreation facilities is also eligible (such as picnic areas, beaches, boating access, fishing and hunting facilities, winter sports areas, playgrounds, athletic fields, tennis courts, and trails). Funds are provided through the sale of oil and mineral leases on State land. Local contributions equal to at least twenty-five percent (25%) of the project cost are required.

There is no minimum or maximum amount for land acquisition projects. The minimum allowable grant for development projects is \$15,000 and the maximum is \$300,000. There are six special initiatives approved by the Trust Fund Board of Trustees for 2013. Proposals will receive special attention if they:

- Acquire land or develop trailways that contribute to an overall state trail system; or
- Provide urban recreation opportunities; or
- Acquire lands open to hunting or development of hunting-related facilities, such as shooting ranges; or
- Acquire lands that provide for deer habitat with thermal cover; or
- Local shooting ranges or state/local shooting range partnerships; or
- Acquire projects that create, establish, and protect wildlife/ecological corridors by connecting to and/or buffering existing protected and managed state or local natural areas, forests or game area.

In 1998, voters approved \$100 million in bonds for parks and recreation development and renovations. \$50 million in grants to local units and development and renovation of public recreation facilities were approved, with the other \$50 million approved for extensive state park renovations. The MDNR supplements the bonds with a matching \$50 million from other funding sources, including state park user fees, the Waterways fund, the Federal Coastal Zone Management, and Land and Water Conservation Fund grants.

USDA Rural Development Grants

The United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) is committed to helping improve the economy and quality of life in rural America. They offer loans, grants and loan guarantees to develop essential community facilities in rural areas, to help create jobs and support economic development and essential services such as housing; health care; first responder services and equipment; and water, electric and communications infrastructure.

Community Development Block Grant (CDBG)

Revenues obtained through the Federal Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) program can be used for a variety of community improvement projects, including development of recreation facilities or land acquisition for new parks or athletic fields in low and moderate income neighborhoods that qualify under the program.

Donations

Businesses, corporations, private clubs, Parent Teacher Organizations and Associations, and community organizations will often contribute to recreation and other improvement programs to benefit the communities in which they are located. Private sector contributions may be in the form of monetary contributions, the donation of land, the provision of volunteer services, or the contribution of equipment or facilities.

Foundations

A foundation is a special non-profit legal entity that is established as a mechanism through which land, cash, and securities can be donated for the benefit of parks and recreation services. The foundation board of directors disburses assets according to a predetermined plan. Funding for recreation facilities through foundations is very limited.

Lease or Contractual Agreements

The Township could consider contracts with private entrepreneurs to provide services at township-owned park facilities, such as recreation programming, food service, or facility maintenance. Typically, the privatization of services can increase recreation opportunities available to residents, while maintaining the Township's administrative costs.

Public Use Conveyances

Administered by the MDNR, this program provides state and lands acquired through delinquent taxes for local government units for public use. Acceptable uses of land acquired under this program include development of local parks.

Public Spaces Community Places

Public Spaces Community Places is a collaborative effort of the Michigan Economic Development Corporation (MEDC), the Michigan Municipal League, and Patronicity where local residents can use crowd-funding to be part of the development of strategic projects in their communities and be backed with a matching grant from MEDC.

4 - Recreation Inventory

Overview

Purpose

The recreation inventory is an essential item, it allows the Township to assess the quantity, type, and location of existing facilities. It also explains the variety of programs and events offered and where there may be opportunities for new programs and events. It serves to help identify where new facilities should be built and demonstrates where ADA upgrades are needed. The facilities inventory should be continually updated as renovations and additions occur so that the list is always up-to-date.

Park Classification

The National Recreation and Parks Association published guidelines for park classification based on size and service area. These classifications are as follows:

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Accessibility Assessment

Complying with accessibility standards and planning for universal design are two extremely important efforts that a municipality must undertake in its effort to protect the health, safety and welfare of its people. This is true not only for those disabled by birth or by accident, but also for the growing population of people entering old age who are finding normal tasks more and more challenging to do. Many able-bodied persons forget that disability is often an eventuality as one grows older. Therefore, Vevay Township should seek to improve the accessibility of its environment not simply to comply with law, but to think more broadly and take steps towards developing a compassionate, inclusive, and accessible community, unencumbered by physical barriers.

This plan rates the accessibility of its existing park facilities, both the facilities themselves (as appropriate), as well as the access routes to them. This rating system is from the Michigan DNR's guidelines for recreation plans. It is intended to establish a baseline so that accessibility needs can be assessed and incorporated into capital improvement projects. This evaluation is not comprehensive and does not identify specific deficiencies.

The following ranking system was applied to each park:

Accessibility Grade	Definition
1	None of the facilities/park areas meet accessibility guidelines.
2	Some of the facilities/park areas meet accessibility guidelines.
3	Most of the facilities/park areas meet accessibility guidelines.
4	The entire park meets accessibility guidelines.
5	The entire park was developed/renovated using the principals of universal design.


Figure 4.2: Accessibility Assessment Table

Existing Facilities

Vevay Township does not currently have any off-street non-motorized facilities however efforts are being made through this planning process as well as through discussions with Ingham County and other surrounding communities to help facilitate the creation of facilities such as a shared-use path to provide additional non-motorized transportation opportunities within the Township as well as providing connections to surrounding communities.

Township Public Property Inventory

Vevay Township's publicly-owned properties include the developed Vevay Township Hall Park, three cemeteries and two undeveloped properties.

Vevay Township Hall Park Location: 780 Eden Rd. Mason MI 48854



The Township Hall site is located approximately one mile south of the City of Mason on Eden Road. The hall occupies approximately 6,000 sq. ft. and the parking area occupies an additional 35,000 sq. ft. Together, the building and associated parking area occupy approximately one acre of the 7.9-acre site. The grounds at the Vevay Township Hall give residents the opportunity to engage in many enjoyable recreational activities. The grounds house several small soccer fields as well as a baseball diamond with dugouts. The park also features a playground with a full play set and swings and a pavilion which is available for all residents to use at no cost.




Vevay Township Hall Park Master Plan: Concept 2

Diamond Road Property

Location: Diamond Rd. Mason MI 48854

Regional Recreation Opportunities

There are many additional recreation facilities and opportunities available in the area surrounding Vevay Township and throughout Ingham County. Some of those facilities are listed here:

Hayhoe Riverwalk Trail

The Hayhoe Riverwalk is a three-mile trail that runs through the City of Mason. The trail travels along the Sycamore Creek as well as on some of the historic rail bed. The trail was built by the Hayhoe family of Ingham County and donated to Mason in honor of their father, the late Richard Hayhoe.

Rayner Park, City of Mason

this 60 Acre park is home to soccer fields, a baseball field, a basketball court, beach volleyball, frisbee golf, horse shoes, a large wooden playground, and a plethora of picnic tables and grills. The pavilion is great for large group picnics and get-togethers with plenty of protected and accessible tables as well as two larger grills. In the south end of the park there is a winding nature trail that connects to Mason High School. The trail features plant identification plaques along the route to provide greater interest and education. The park also includes two ponds which connect to the Ingham County Rayner Creek Drain.

Connect Sports

A faith-based youth sports organization which features archery, basketball, cheerleading, flag football and soccer.

The ministries involved include:

- Mason First Church of the Nazarene
- Eden United Brethren
- Aurelius Baptist Church
- Mason Community Church

The ROC (Recreation Outreach Center)

Built on 45 acres of property purchased by the Mason First Nazarene church opened in April of 2012. This 16,000 square foot structure includes a gym featuring a full-size basketball court, an activity room with large-screen video monitors, a kitchen, and a room designed for use as a state-of-the-art computer lab.

Ingham County Fairgrounds

The Ingham County Fair and Exposition Center hosts agricultural, educational, and entertainment events. Situated on a 72 acre, park-like setting, the Ingham County Fairgrounds and Exposition Center offer unique experiences to the Greater Lansing Community. Whether it is a wedding hosted in the newly renovated banquet facility or one of the nearly 70 events hosted on the Ingham County Fair and Exposition Center campus, there is something for everyone.

Hawk Island County Park

A 100 acre park, located on Cavanaugh Road, between Pennsylvania Avenue and Aurelius Road, in south Lansing. Hawk Island offers rowboat and pedal boat rental, a swimming beach, Splash Pad, picnic areas and shelters, sand volleyball, horseshoes, paved accessible walkways (1.5 miles) and fishing docks and a concession stand.

Burchfield County Park

With 540 acres of scenic woods, trails and beach, Burchfield Park is Ingham County's largest park. Ribboned throughout by the Grand River, this outdoor haven harbors some of the best bank and boat fishing available in Ingham County. Burchfield Park offers a beach, bathhouse, canoe & kayak rentals and trips, cross country skiing & rental, hiking trails, horseshoe pits, two 18 hole disc golf courses, mountain biking trails, nature day camp, pedal boat rental, picnic grounds and shelters, playgrounds, sand volleyball courts, sledding hills, softball diamond, stocked fishing pond, winter snack bar, and a winter warming lodge.

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5 The Planning Process

5 - The Planning Process

Plan Development Process

The consultant reviewed Vevay Township's current demographics, current budgets and revenues, past planning efforts and perceived initial priorities. The consultant met with the Township Supervisor and Township Board to establish some initial study parameters and planning direction. As part of the inventory gathering process, the consultant performed a physical inventory by visiting Vevay Township Hall Park as well as the two undeveloped Township owned properties.

The information gathered was then synthesized into the proposed goals and objectives of this plan. The goals and objectives were then further refined with the assignment of phasing and priority suggestions (actions), as well as estimates of probable cost (capital improvements schedule). Subsequent refinement of the plan was performed through various discussions with township officials, public comment, and investigation of funding strategies and sources to eventually produce the final 5-Year Community Parks and Recreation Plan.

Public Participation

An effective means of obtaining public input is critical for the development of a Community Parks and Recreation Plan. Public input is also required by the Michigan Department of Natural Resources' "Guidelines for the Development of Community Park, Recreation Open Space and Greenway Plans." For Vevay Township's plan, several means of gaining input were used, including:

- Online opinion survey: 10/12/2021 12/1/2021
- Public input meeting: 10/12/2021
- Public hearing 1/18/2022
- One Month Review Period Posted on the Township's website, hard copy at Township Hall - 12/13/2021 - 1/14/2022


Online Opinion Survey

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At the initial stage of the Recreation Master Planning process, an online survey questionnaire was developed to gauge public opinion on the future of Vevay Township's Parks and Recreation.

The online survey was conducted using the web-based "Survey Monkey" opinion survey instrument. The survey was placed online 10/12/2021 and was closed 12/1/2021 It was publicized on the Township's website and facebook page. Yard signs featuring QR code links were also placed throughout the Township to advertise the survey.

A total of 125 responses were received for the online survey. Details of responses are shown in the Appendix.



Goals & Objectives

6 - Goals and Objectives

Overview

In the broadest sense, a Parks and Recreation Plan should offer the community a series of guidelines or recommendations for making consistent and rational public decisions regarding the delivery of recreation programs and facilities. Goals and objectives, in the context of recreation and park planning, should be the guiding influence determining the nature and extent of future park acquisition, development, administrative, and programming actions. They should be idealistic to the extent that they provide a desirable condition to strive towards and be ready for opportunities that may not be evident today such as new grant programs, benefactors, donations etc that present themselves. However, in order to be reasonably capable of being achieved, the goals must be tempered by the recognition of financial, social, physical and political realities. Successful policy should further recognize the evaluation of the community's recreation system and the relationship of this system to relevant demographic characteristics.

Goals should be broad and address general needs and establish the basis for setting specific programmed objectives. Objectives are measurable results that the Township can work toward accomplishing. Both offer policy direction and the framework for recreation providers. The following policy statements reflect the Township's short and long-term recreation needs identified in the previous chapters. Specific methods for achieving these goals are described in the Action Program and Capital Improvement Plan in the following section.

Township Parks and Recreation Goals and Objectives

The following goals and objectives provide the foundation of the Township's Community Parks & Recreation Plan, and are to be used as a framework for future implementation strategies.

Overall

- 1. Enhance and increase the quality of life for the residents of Vevay Township by providing a full range of recreation programs, recreation facilities, athletic fields, and pathways to meet their recreational needs.
- II. Provide a consistent level of funding for improvements and continued maintenance for Vevay Township Hall Park and any future recreation facilities.
- III. Strengthen community image and sense of place. Parks, recreation facilities, programs and community events are key factors to achieve this goal.
- IV. Protect environmental resources. Natural resources and habitats are preserved by acquiring, managing, and restoring valuable resources as open space (rivers, streams, greenways, view sheds, forests, and other habitat areas).

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- A. Provide superior and unique recreational activities and facilities, which emphasize the natural environment.
- B. Work with other surrounding communities to revive initiatives that promote each others' natural features and cross promote so people can better learn about the natural resources, ecological values and history.
- V. Foster human development. Parks and recreation services foster social, intellectual, physical, and emotional development of children, youth, and adults.
 - A. Work with the local schools to enable communications that will lead to enhancing the development of children and youth through after school facilities/programs.
- VI. Provide recreational experiences. A variety of benefits to individuals and the community are achieved through programmed and unprogrammed recreation.
- VII. Promote health and wellness. Participation in recreation significantly improves physical and emotional health.
 - A. Offer a wide array of classes and programs, specifically programs for school-aged children.
 - B. Provide recreational programs that emphasize fitness and staying healthy. Outdoor fitness stations or classes can provide places to exercise out of doors on their own or with groups.
- VIII. Continue to communicate with the public whenever possible through various means.

Administration and Organization

- I. Investigate innovative ways to fund improvements and programming.
 - A. Apply for state, federal and local grants for recreation, athletic, leisure, and cultural arts programs.
 - B. Seek donations from foundations, corporations, service clubs and local businesses, as well as individual sponsorships.
 - C. Maintain a fair and reasonable user fee system for programming.
- II. Provide necessary staffing and an administrative infrastructure at levels commensurate to programming and maintenance needs to support the expansion of recreation opportunities.
- III. Continue to monitor and adjust program offerings to reflect changing recreation preferences and age characteristics.
- IV. Market recreation services to potential users:
 - A. Maintain the township website to provide up-to-date information to the public.
 - B. Maintain and build relations with senior citizens, local businesses and community groups.
- V. Continue and improve coordination with other organizations:

A. Maintain and foster communication between the Township and neighboring communities such as the City of Mason.

Facilities

- I. Provide facilities that meet the community-wide recreation needs of Vevay Township residents.
 - A. Develop additional features at Vevay Township Hall Park to meet the needs of all activities, programs and users.
 - B. Ensure accessibility to recreation facilities and programs by creating barrier-free facilities and providing an opportunity for "inclusive and/or universal recreation."
- II. Provide, promote and encourage the establishment and maintenance of a non-motorized system consisting of trails, pathways, bicycle lanes, shared roads other forms of active transportation that will connect with other facilities within the region.
- III. Maintain a balanced system of parks by having well-operated and maintained facilities:
 - A. Continue the scheduling of operations, including regular inspections, to ensure all parks and facilities are neat in appearance and well-operated and maintained.
 - B. Coordinate and assist in planned events in public spaces, parks, and facilities.

Recreation Land

- I. Acquire recreation land to create community and neighborhood parks, which are appropriate, convenient and accessible to all residents:
 - A. Explore acquisition of properties that include natural features or recreational opportunities as they become available.
- II. Develop and expand the Non-Motorized system throughout the Township.
 - A. Explore the acquisition of land or easements that can be used to provide non-motorized connections between Vevay Township Hall Park and other amenities within the township and the surrounding communities.
 - B. Explore areas where on-road facilities or separated pathways can be added within existing public right-of-ways to improve non-motorized travel throughout the township.
 - C. Install wayfinding signs, interpretative kiosks, and respite stations throughout the existing and future non-motorized system.
 - D. Coordinate with surrounding communities and Tri-County planning efforts to create to facilitate a regional non-motorized connections.

Regional Connectivity

Currently a non-motorized trail system exists between the City of Lansing and Delhi Township. Planning efforts and construction projects are currently underway that are working toward the goal of connecting the Delhi Township non-motorized trail system to the City of Mason's Hayhoe Riverwalk Trail. The Hayhoe Riverwalk Trail currently ends just beyond the Vevay Township border. Making a non-motorized connection from the Hayhoe Riverwalk trail to Vevay Township Hall is a crucial first step toward Vevay's regional connectivity. Next, efforts should be made with the goal of connecting Vevay Township south to the City of Leslie and eventually to the City of Jackson and beyond. Routes utilizing existing rights-of-way and the acquisition of easements along the former Interurban line, existing utility corridors, or from private owners are all options that should be explored.




Figure 6.1: Map of Potential Regional Connections

The following action plan or "Capital Improvement Plan" (CIP) was developed based upon information gathered from public input, interviews, demographic data, land use trends and efforts of adjacent communities. The plan covers the next five years. These projects may be funded through grant sources such as those provided through the Michigan Department of Natural Resources (MDNR) Land and Water Conservation Fund, Michigan Natural Resources Trust Fund, Recreation Passport Grants, Waterways Program Grants, Michigan Habitat Improvement Fund Program Grants, Invasive Species Grant Program, or Wildlife Habitat Grant Program. There may be grants available through private corporations, non-profit organizations, and other state and federal agencies.

Please note: The capital improvements are listed in no particular order. The matrix provides a target year, the project location, a description, an estimated range of likely costs, revenue sources, and goals. It is intended to be used as a guideline for planning.

WHEREAS, the Vevay Township Board of Trustees (Board) established a Recreation Committee in 2003 to develop a Community Recreation Plan; and

WHEREAS, the Recreation Committee has completed their obligation and the Committee dissolved; and

WHEREAS, the Board is committed to assuring Vevay Township residents are afforded opportunities for quality recreation facilities and trails in a safe and convenient setting; and

WHEREAS, the Board is committed to establishing and maintaining a purposeful and realistic strategy to guide and improve recreation programs and facilities in Vevay Township to meet the recreation needs of area residents; and

WHEREAS, the Board is in the process of developing a 5-Year Community Parks & Recreation Plan (Plan) to not only guide the Township in its decision making, but to also enhance the Township's ability to obtain grants and private donations, especially the Ingham County Parks and Trails millage fund and various grant funds available through the state, such as the Natural Resources Fund; and

WHEREAS, the Board, at the end of July 2021, has submitted a planning grant application to the Ingham County Parks and Trails Commission for millage funds; and

WHEREAS, the Board has sought public input in the formulation of the Plan, including a public hearing on October 12, 2021, and a widely publicized internet survey; and

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board hereby establishes a Recreation Commission (Commission) to assess Township recreational needs and solicit public input in the formulation of a new Plan, as well as guide the Township through the various grant processes to leverage funds to maximize the effective use of taxpayer dollars in developing recreational facilities and possibilities; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Board shall appoint a Commission consisting of five to nine members; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Board shall appoint members to three-year terms except that the initial appointment terms in 2021 shall be staggered at one, two, and three years, as determined by the Board, and all appointments in 2022 and after shall be for full three-year terms; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Commission shall elect a Chairperson, Vice-Chair, and Secretary to serve one-year terms; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Commission assist the Board in any pertinent manner in preparing grant applications, seeking public input and assistance, and communicating with the public; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Commission plan for future recreation possibilities, maintenance, and upgrades; make recommendations to the Board of Trustees for revisions to the Plan; and have open meetings to discuss issues relating to recreation; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that Resolution 22-01 is hereby adopted effective *January 12*, 2022; and

Q5 Are you in favor of extending the Hayhoe Trail to the Township Hall?



In order to respect the privacy of the respondents, responses from question 24 have been excluded from this summary.

Additional Community Input

Vevay Township received email correspondence from four community members in response to these planning efforts. Two of the comments received included support for extending the Hayhoe Trail to the Township Hall with an emphasis on providing safe access and increased health opportunities.

A third correspondence expressed that the individual travels to East Lansing about four times per week to play pickleball and they described their excitement at the prospect of the two pickleball courts in the Township Hall Park Master Plan. This individul also expressed support for bicycle facilities.

The other correspondence received was from an individual who lives in close proximity to the Township's College Rd. property. This person expressed their desire for the property to remain undeveloped or used for agriculture, stating that they chose to build their home in the country and would like it to remain as such.
